Q&A with Ron and Amanda

PRNSA: Please share a bit about your connection to Point Reyes National Seashore.

Ron & Amanda: We've lived in Marin most of our lives. Both of us have hiked, cycled, kayaked, been birding (Ron), and have many friends here. We moved to Point Reyes Station to live full time and have been most interested in being involved in and supporting all the ways people can sustainably access this amazing area.
