


#### **Resilience in Community Plant Walk**



**Mileage:** ~3 miles


# A Vision for Healing Coastal Prairie

Mileage: ~2 miles **Difficulty Level:** Moderate


# **Elk Recovery Over Time**



Point Reyes is the only national park unit where tule elk are found. Hike along the Point and enjoy spectacular views while learning about the area's unique ecology and current management practices.

**Difficulty Level:** Challenging **Mileage:** ~5 miles


# Fire's Role in the Ecosystem



Return to Sky Trail roughly five years after the Woodward and 30 years after the Vision Fire burned through the landscape. Hike along the Inverness Ridge and learn about the importance of fire regrowth and the park's fire management efforts.

Mileage: ~4 miles **Difficulty Level:** Moderate

### Coast Miwok History & Co-Stewardship



Join tribal leaders and staff from the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (FIGR) for a conversation and walk that explores the Tribe's special connection to Point Reyes National Seashore as their ancestral homeland.

**Difficulty Level:** Easy

Mileage: <1 mile
